Culebra, Puerto Rico

Culebra is only a 20-mile downwind sail from St. Thomas but a world of difference. The first thing you'll notice is how laidback everyone is on the island and it is very safe. Most people we met had been going to the island for 20+ years or had bought vacation homes there. You can rent a golf cart to tour around or just walk on the small island. Most places have local maps to grab so you can find your way around. Ensenada Honda is the main harbor where everyone anchors and it's wide open. You can clear in by



phone with Culebra Customs at (787) 742-3531. If it's after hours or if they don't answer you can clear in by calling the San Juan airport at (787) 729-6840. You can drop anchor way up inside the harbor and tie your dinghy to the town dock while you go exploring.

BEACHES - Flamenco Beach is the most famous. It's been rated as the 3rd best beach in the world by Trip Advisor and the 2nd best beach in the world by Discover Channel and other magazines. It's quite gorgeous and is the only beach with food and drink concessions. But the back-story is far different from the tranquil turquoise waters you see today. From 1939-1975 Culebra and Vieques were used by the



U.S. Navy as a gunnery and bombing practice site. This was done initially in preparation for our involvement in World War II. We left behind a couple of tanks on Flamenco Beach and an awful lot of unexploded ordinance around the islands. You can hike out to Carlos Rosario Beach which is supposed to be one of the better snorkeling spots. To get there you have to slip through a locked gate (on the far west side of the parking lot) where

a sign warns you not to trespass because of the danger of unexploded ordinance. Yet they leave the chain loose enough so that you "can" slip through it and everybody does. Zoni Beach on the NE side is the longest white beach on the island. We stumbled across an art installation of stick people in various poses that someone created out of tree branches, palm fronds and coconuts.

BARS/RESTAURANTS – The most popular by far is the Dinghy Dock restaurant. All the expats and many locals turn out every day for happy hour and some drummers provide entertainment on Saturday nights. Mamacita's, which is on the canal, is another large restaurant open daily. Pan Deli serves a nice breakfast and Zako's Tacos has great atmosphere as well as being inexpensive. Most of the fine dining places are only open Wed-Sun evenings.

PROVISIONS – Colmado Milka, on the same side of the canal as the Dinghy Dock, is the main grocery store and they have great meats. On Tuesday and Friday mornings there is a farmer's market in town where you can get fresh fruits and vegetables you don't normally find in the grocery stores. The town of Dewey is mainly a one-street town leading down to the ferry dock where you can catch a ferry to Puerto Rico for a mere \$2.25 and avoid the usual beat back.

They show movies every Tuesday and Friday night at the library. The theatre is actually inside a large container. There are 5 seats in a row and only 5 ½ rows. Yet they have your standard movie-theatre type seats, decent sound and a 70" screen. You order your popcorn when you get there and a half hour later the woman walks around asking who ordered the popcorn and drinks. You raise your hand like when you were in school. It's a unique island experience! There's a second container that houses all the books for the library but that's only open from 10-2.

CULEBRITA – You can't visit Culebra and not sail over to the uninhabited island of Culebrita. There are mooring balls inside the northern bay or you can anchor on the west side if the north side is rough or difficult to traverse. Paths lead to various beaches. If you hike over the rocks to the northern tip, you'll find the tide pools they call The Jacuzzis. When the waves come in, you stand near the edge, grab some handholds in the rocks and wait for the wave to come in and shower you. It's a rush! Then head up the cliffs over the eastern side on goat trails and down to the beach near the lighthouse. You can hike around the whole island and snorkel in the calm bay on the west side.



We found Culebra to be very charming, the people are very friendly and it is so safe. It's like the rest of the Caribbean used to be. But visit soon as progress is coming. They are installing power hook-ups at the town dock and mooring buoys are planned.

Satellite Technology by Jeff Thomassen, CTO at OCENS

You have dreamed of sailing to exotic places. You purchased the boat and did a bit of sailing with it. Now you have joined the Salty Dawg Sailing Association in anticipation of heading out on the big blue. Wait.... Why did you join the Salty Dawg Sailing Association? Because the Salty Dawg community has a wealth of knowledge that can help make your dreams come true!

So, true to form - here we will try to help you understand a little more about satellite phones. As you start thinking about the communications options you will want/need out there, having some basic understanding of how the satellite network operates and what to expect in the real world, will help you make the best choice for your needs, and hopefully dispel some of those slight advertising misrepresentations.



The first thing we need to understand about satellite technology is that it depends on line-of-sight. As in, your satellite phones antenna must be able to "see" directly to the satellite with no obstructions like buildings, mountains, solar panels, carbon fiber sails, hard biminis, decks, etc. Think of your satellite phone's antenna as a flashlight and the antenna on the satellite being a flashlight as well. They need to be able to see each others light to complete a call. Lets take a look at the Iridium system for now.

The Iridium network is comprised of 66 LEO (low Earth orbit) satellites and some ground stations. The

Iridium satellites are in a polar orbit (North/South) at an altitude of approximately 483 miles above earth and travel at approximately 16,689 mph resulting in a complete orbit of earth approximately every 100 minutes, or about 12 minutes to traverse overhead at your location assuming they are moving directly overhead. Another key feature with Iridium is that they can transfer your call from satellite to satellite till it reaches the nearest ground station. This is what enables Iridium to provide 100% global coverage.



What does this mean for you on your boat with an Iridium phone? Well it means that when you are near the poles you will have access to many satellites as they are all converging at the pole, and they will be much higher in the sky - resulting in great signal strength and longer call durations with less interruptions or dropped calls. As you move towards the equator the satellites get a little more spread out resulting in less satellites in view at any given time and they will be lower to the horizon in general. Because of this you will see lower average signal strength and may experience more call interruptions as a result.

The current satellites and user hardware (Iridium GO!, 9575, 9555 phones included) allow for voice and data, however the data via the handheld phone or the newer GO! device is only about 2400 baud (15KB per minute). It is key that you also look into services that optimize this connection or provide data that is packaged in a way as to minimize the file sizes so that you can download that data. You will not be surfing the web or doing any banking at 2400 baud. You will need to focus on basic email services and dedicated weather solutions to make the most of this.

Iridium's satellites have been in orbit since the mid 1990s and are way beyond their initial projected lifespan. But have no fear! On January 14th they successfully launched the first 10 of their second generation satellites. These launches will continue over the next year and a half. As the new satellites get into orbit they will begin to replace the older ones, gradually improving the reliability of the service and call quality. These new satellites will also allow Iridium to roll out some new services and faster data speeds once there are enough new satellites up. We expect to see this all happen no sooner than mid 2018 or so, even though you will certainly be hearing a lot of hype around this in months to come.

Rally To Cuba

The Rally to Cuba will depart Virgin Gorda in the BVI in late March and will be in Cuba April 5 – 20, 2017. While most vessels will be cruising to Cuba from the BVI, others will



cruise from the US East Coast and the Bahamas. The 14 day visit will support an educational-based, people-to-people exchange. The Rally complies with OFAC and US Coast Guard regulations.

This new Rally is a natural, downwind passage from the Caribbean back to the US, via Cuba. In order to conduct the proper research in support of this educational activity, and with the time constraint from various regulations and American insurance companies, the Rally will make landfall in Havana and conduct its research activities in Northwest Cuba. This is a large area to visit including Havana, villages and countryside on the north and south shores.

With the structured nature of the visit, in order to properly manage the activity, the Rally is being limited to 24 boats. With the strong interest in this rally, there could have easily been more than 75 vessels. All participants will be busy conducting our planned research, which will be designed to develop reference material that hopefully will be of interest to all US cruisers with future plans to visit Cuba.

Spring Rally to the U.S.

Registration is now open for the 2017 Spring Rally from the British Virgin Islands to the USA. The rally will depart the British Virgin Islands on May 15 after several days of social activities, weather briefings, and boat preparations.

The Spring Rally from the BVI to the cruiser's US port of choice is a popular event that attracts veteran Salty Dawgs who have completed the rally south in the fall and other sailors wishing to cruise-in-company to the States.



We also welcome cruisers from Europe who have enjoyed the Caribbean this winter and look forward to cruising the East Coast of the US and Canada next summer. Some rally participants are planning a stop in Bermuda to witness the Louis Vuitton America's Cup Qualifiers & Challenger playoffs.

Spring Rally participants are invited to gather in Virgin Gorda Sound on May 3 to enjoy the final Michael Beans' pirate show of the season and the Jumbies at the Leverick Bay Resort before a departure dinner at the Bitter End Yacht Club. Then the fleet will move on to Nanny Cay Marina on Tortola for fun events like a beach BBQ and a lasagna dinner. Pre-departure activities focus on weather briefings and final preparations before departure on May 15.

Weather forecasts and routing guidance from Marine Weather Service's chief forecaster Chris Parker begin prior to departure and continue throughout the passage. Recipes

Pork Tenderloin Under Pressure!

Take two pork tenderloins(3 lbs) and rub with your favorite spice rub. Let sit for an hour or so. Or use already marinated Smithfield Pork Loins, they are good too.

In pressure cooker, put in a little oil, and brown the loins on all sides for about 5 minutes for color. Add 1/2 cup liquid, I use apple cider, throw in some raw chopped apples and a few cranberries. You don't have to add the fruit, but it makes a great sauce.

Bring pressure cooker to pressure. Let it cook for two minutes at pressure. TURN OFF HEAT and let the cooker cool on it own for `15 minutes. Yes, I know... but it really works! Do not do a fast release as that makes the meat tough. You can use the same technique for other types of meats, just be sure they are in similar size to a pork tenderloin, not too thick.
