# **Cruising Articles**

### Cruising Martinique, A Gem in the Windward Islands by Robert J. Osborn Jr., s/v Pandora

This year, when I decided to do the Salty Dawg Rally to Antigua I was particularly excited about exploring the Windward island chain south from there. A particular draw was the fact that my good friend and fellow Dawg, Bill from Kalunamoo, told me that "Antigua and south is where the REAL Caribbean begins." The short distances between islands, variety of cultures punctuated by the fabulous food of the French islands, illustrates why so many cruisers return year after year.

Along with visiting many of the islands between Antigua and Bequia, this season we spent a good deal of time in Martinique, visiting a number of harbors. In particular, we spent quite a bit of time in St Anne, near the southern end of Martinique. St Anne is a small coastal village that is very popular with cruisers and "oh so French," with quaint shops and restaurants as well as a busy bakery that churns out a dizzying selection of pastries and breads from sunrise to sunset.

Here a day isn't complete without a visit, or two, to enjoy something right out of the oven with the surf gently lapping at the back of the building where cruisers congregate for a morning espresso and croissant while using the free WiFi to catch up on what's going on back home. Fortunately, for all of us who are "addicted" to The Web, it's fairly easy to stay connected. However, when everyone is trying to get online, it will remind you of the "good old days" of CompuServe and dial-up.

Some 300 cruisers are anchored off of the beaches, some visiting for a day or two and the others staying for the entire winter season. Nearby Le Marin, home of the largest marina and mooring field in the Windward chain, has over 1,000 boats visiting or permanently ported there at any given time. A mooring for 47' Pandora was astonishingly inexpensive at about \$125/month about the same price as two days in Vineyard Haven, MA. As an added bonus, Norwegian Air flies from Martinique with direct flights to New York, Providence RI and other destinations for a very reasonable \$250 round trip. If you want to take a "break" from cruising to visit Family, or have them fly in to join you, Martinique is a great place to use as your cruising base.

Martinique is very mountainous with its highest peak over 4,000 feet, rising abruptly from waters nearly two miles deep close to shore. Mt Pelée, currently quiet, violently exploded in 1902 killing everyone in its path saving two, one a prisoner in a strong jail cell in the coastal city of St Pierre.

With near constant clouds on the tops of the mountains and strong moist trade winds blowing from the east, rainfall is abundant, feeding rivers, streams and lush rainforests. Agriculture has always been a big part of Martinique with the largest crop being sugarcane since the 17<sup>th</sup> century and unlike the English islands, nearly the entire production is still consumed in the making of Rhum Agricole, rum made from cane juice as opposed to molasses, the byproduct of sugar production, more typical of the English islands.

During our nearly one month stay on the island we visited a number of other distilleries, enjoying what might be called the "Martinique rum

crawl." It's worth the effort since there is so much fascinating history to enjoy as you <sup>E</sup> make your way from estate to estate.

Another successful Salty Dawg Rally is complete. Boats returning from Antigua and the Virgin Islands enjoyed a downwind sail back to the East Coast of the United States. Taking advantage of an unusually favorable weather pattern for this time of year, all except one boat sailed directly to the U.S.. *Lady Jane*, a UK-flagged vessel, skippered by Allen and Maria Wadsworth, stopped in Bermuda to enjoy one last island experience before coming to the States.

# Sailing in Fog

This article should be of interest to Salty Dawgs cruising the eastern coast of the United States and of particular interest to those participating in the Salty Dawg Rally to Maine and Rally to Nova Scotia this summer.

For those of you who have spent your time on Western Long Island Sound and points South and West - you are about to have a "New" Experience - New England Fog! This fog condition is caused by water temperatures in the 40-50 degree Fahrenheit and the heat from the summer sun. It usually dissipates during the day but comes back during the night. In the old days - before Radar and AIS - we frequently had "Lay Days" - where the Skipper decided the fog was too thick for safe navigation and we all went back to bed.



When you wake up in the morning and discover that you cannot see the boat on the next mooring - never mind the Dinghy Dock - you will realize you are in a new world! I remember leaving St. John's New Brunswick in mid July on 47 Ft Ketch - and barely being able to see the running lights on the bow pulpit from the cockpit! This fog is thick.

Fog creates some hazards to your cruising:

### Navigation

When you cannot see the Marks until you almost hit them, combined with the rock studded New England Coast and fairly strong Tidal Currents - your job as navigator just became more difficult. GPS Chart Plotters make the task easier, but remember, you are one lightning strike away from going back to the basics - and we do have frequent thunderstorms in the summer!

You need to carefully plot your courses, watch your ETAs, watch your steering and allow for current set.

Fog Can Make Bridges Disappear!

### **Collision Avoidance**

- For me, Number one is putting out a Security Call on Channels13/16 about every 20 minutes for a 6-8 knot boat. You merely say: "Yacht "XX" @ Lat/Long steering Degrees Magnetic @ 7 Knots." Anyone in the neighborhood will, probably call you to confirm you know where they are.
- 2) Radar Reflector: You cannot sail these waters without one in the rigging. A 40' yacht is mostly invisible to a Merchant Ship's Radar, being confused in the sea clutter and the general inattention of today's undermanned Bride Watches. You are simply "not there" until the crash. <u>Radar Reflector: Echo Max RM 250</u>
- 3) Have your Compass Swung (adjusted) by a Professional Compass Adjustor. You will really have to pay attention to your steering and remember a 5 Degree steering error over 11.5 Nautical Miles travelled - puts you a Mile off the Destination!

4) AIS - the Automatic Identification System: This is an indispensable Electronic Device that transmits your identity, position, speed and heading. Install the class B AIS transponder that transmits both Send & Receive Information. It is nice to know about the other boat - but it might be more important that she knows about you especially if it is a large or fast vessel. This system also enables you to identify your Radar Contacts "out there" and call them by name on your VHF - Channels 16/13.



### Installation Tips:

- You want your Antenna as high as possible - which means the Masthead - so as to get the maximum Range for your signal

- Install the Vesper Power Assisted Amplifier on your Antenna which enables you to share the Antenna with your VHF and not lose signals.

### AIS Recommendation:

- Ship AIS System Vesper XB-6000 Class B AIS Transponder
- VHF Antenna Splitter Vesper AIS Antenna Splitter

### Radar

I consider Radar indispensible today. But you have to remember that this is not a Simulator, but just white dots on a screen! I strongly suggest that you take a Radar Course or at least some professional



instruction from an experienced Navigator or Electronics Tech if you are unfamiliar with your set and its capabilities.

You should find the coasts of Maine and Nova Scotia a fascinating and wonderful cruising experience. Just do not forget your winter clothes: In Mid July coming down the Grand Manan Channel I was wearing Long Underwear, a guilted jacket and foul weather gear with gloves, scarf and watch cap - and I was none too warm!

Wish I was coming with you.

Recipe

# **Olive Tapenade**

I'm always looking for different appetizers to share with friends aboard Blue Sky. This recipe is simple enough to make ahead and keep on hand in a jar in the fridge for up to 10 days. It goes well on toasted baguette slices or crackers. Don't expect it to last long, it is delicious.

### Ingredients:

- 1 (5 ounce) jar pitted black olives
- 1 (7 ounce) jar green pimento olives
- 2 ½ TBSP Ólive Oil
- 1-2 cloves garlic, chopped
- 5/8 cup white onion, chopped
- 1 tsp capers
- Ground black pepper (several shakes)

### Directions:

- 1 Drain liquid from both olive containers
- 2 Finely chop garlic and onion



3 – Put all ingredients into a food processor and pulse 5-10 times. You want little chunks, not mush.
4 – Refrigerate until ready to serve. Place on toasted baguette slices just before you serve so the bread doesn't get too wet. Or allow guests to top their cracker of choice.
